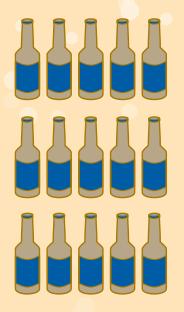

WHAT HAPPENS TO YOU?^{2,3}

- Aggressive, irrational behavior
- Arguments
- Violence
- Depression
- Nervousness

Cancer of throat and mouth

- Frequent colds
- Reduced resistance to infection
- Increased risk of pneumonia

Liver damage

Ulcers

- Trembling hands
- Tingling fingers
- Numbness
- Painful nerves

Men: Impaired sexual performance

Impaired sensation leading to falls

- Numb, tingling toes
- Painful nerves

SHORT-TERM HEALTH RISKS

INJURIES

• Motor vehicle crashes, falls, drownings, burns

VIOLENCE

Homicide, suicide, sexual assault, intimate partner violence

ALCOHOL POISONING

REPRODUCTIVE HEALTH

 Risky sexual behaviors, unintended pregnancy, sexually transmitted diseases including HIV, miscarriage, stillbirth, fetal alcohol spectrum disorders (FASDs)

LONG-TERM HEALTH RISKS

CHRONIC DISEASES

 High blood pressure, heart disease, stroke, liver disease, digestive problems

CANCERS

· Breast, mouth and throat, liver, colon

LEARNING AND MEMORY PROBLEMS

· Dementia, poor school performance

MENTAL HEALTH

Depression, anxiety

SOCIAL PROBLEMS

 Lost productivity, family problems, unemployment

ALCOHOL DEPENDENCE

Alcohol dependence
 Memory loss

Premature aging

- Weakness of heart muscle
 - Heart failure
 - Anemia
 - Impaired blood clotting
 - Breast cancer
 - Vitamin deficiency
- Bleeding of the stomach
 - Severe inflammation of the stomach
 - Vomiting
 - Diarrhea
 - Malnutrition

Inflammation of the pancreas

Women:

Risk of birth defects, developmentallychallenged or low-birthweight babies
